
Process







Flash Cards

Two ways to practice with cards:

- Test Cards
- 1. I read
- 2. I cover it up
- 3. I test myself

- 1. Put the answers on the back, but you will need to remember more at once before you check
- 2. Use a piece of paper and move down to reveal answers as you guess the contents.
- These techniques are very useful for checking that you know key facts.

- engage with Google Classroom regularly EVERYTHING you need is there!
 - use the Curriculum Maps & Revision (Seneca) 2023-24 section to support independent revision
- visit the AQA website & access past papers in the relevant GCSE Language (8700) and GCSE Literature (8702) sections know the required skill sets for each paper at question-level
- → read a range of non-fiction online (particularly Opinion & Comment sections):
 https://www.independent.co.uk/voices/comment;
 https://www.theguardian.com/tone/comment
- create flashcards to revise, retain & analyse key quotations
- boost your revision and engagement with skill sets using online resources such as: BBC Bitesize: Language & Literature; Youtube: Mr Bruff/Mr Salles
- → use your CGP revision and text guides (bundles purchased in Yr10)



French and German

Students are entered for higher or foundation and need to know the expectations for each paper for their tier, particularly for speaking and writing.

Revision Strategies

- Put up post-it notes with key structures and vocabulary
- Use look / cover / write / check to learn key verb phrases and vocabulary
- Make topic maps for key topics and sub-topics
- Listen to music, films and TV programmes in the language to practise listening without stress
- Use Lyrics training to practise your listening and karaoke skills (https://lyricstraining.com/)
- Use Linguascope intermediate to practise the language and grammar in games (https://www.linguascope.com/ - user name chilwell, password beeston115)
- Use Languages online to practise the grammar (https://www.languagesonline.org.uk/Hotpotatoes/index.html#gsc.tab=0)
- In Google classroom look back at the grids to practise the tenses and the key vocabulary PowerPoints
- Record answers to the speaking questions and listen back to them to improve pronunciation and speed

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Terminal examinations

 Every GCSE-level qualification is required to have at least one examined component, taken in the summer examination series in the year of certification (terminal assessment).

 This must make up at least 40% of the total marks for the qualification. Many qualifications are 100% exam assessment.

 With such a large proportion of marks up for grabs in the summer exams, it is vital that students prepare appropriately.

When to revise



 A good, structured revision programme should be set up now, and should continue right through to the end of the exams.

 This session will set out a really effective model for revision that all students are encouraged to follow.

 If students are going away over the Christmas, February half-term, Easter or May half-term breaks then revision material needs to go with them.



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
